FLOWER OF THE WEEK: LEWISIA **107th in a series**

For intense colours, lewisias hybrids take some beating. Their silky flowers come in a range from almost-luminous white through orange and scarlet to intense carmine. They need occupy no more than a square yard – and a vertical one at that. Being planted sideways, in a rockery or a wall with good compost in planting holes, is the secret of success with lewisias because moisture drains off. Allowed to settle among the plants' foliage, it can kill them.

The types popular today are hybrids of *Lewisia cotyledon*, an evergreen alpine that likes acid soil. The plants have rosettes of fleshy, succulent leaves and produce clusters of flowers from May to July on 20cm (8in) stems. In cold, exposed areas, they are cultivated mainly in alpine houses but can thrive outdoors if grown as described above in sites sheltered from coastal gales. They need a gritty, acidic, soil-based compost.

Lewisias are named after Captain Meriwether Lewis who made the first coast-to-coast exploration of North America in the early 19th century, discovering many plants. In the remote north-west he found a plant used as a food by the native Americans but dubbed bitter-root by Lewis's party who found it almost inedible. Some years later a German botanist planted a dried-up root Lewis had brought back. It amazed him, first by growing and then by producing beautiful flowers. *Cotyledon*, the name of a separate genus with rosettes of succulent leaves, has been appended to lewisias. It is also used to describe the "seed leaves", the round pair of leaves produced by seeds of most plants when they first germinate. The term comes from the Greek for a cavity or small cup.

Lewisias can be grown from seed in a cold frame in autumn or propagated from offsets in early summer. Grown outdoors, they sometimes need protection from slugs. Under glass, aphids can be a problem.
