FLOWER OF THE WEEK: LANTANA

Lantanas are rarely seen in the UK but frequently grown to brighten hotel garden borders in exotic holiday destinations. As plants from tropical and sub-tropical areas of the Americas and South Africa they thrive in British gardens only in warm summers. However, they can be grown here under glass or as houseplants at a minimum temperature of 10C (50F).

The most vivid kinds are varieties of *Lantana camara*, sometimes known as yellow sage, from the West Indies, which produce longlasting roundish heads of many blooms, often in two colours, from spring to late autumn. The plants often produce a cluster of green berries which ripe to deep purple and should not be eaten. Seeds and plants of *Lantana camara* are readily available online in Britain.

In ideal conditions plants can grow over several years to a metre or more in height and spread but are easily restricted to a more manageable size for domestic display by winter pruning. Indeed, *Lantana camara* is so vigorous in hospitable climates that in parts of south-east Asia and the Pacific islands it has become an invasive weed. Another drawback is its toxicity to humans – so gloves should be worn to handle the plants – and to livestock, creating a problem in those places where it has naturalised.

The best varieties of *Lantana camara* include Feston Rose (pictured), with bicoloured pink and yellow flowers; Radiation, also bicoloured, with orange and red blooms; Cream Carpet, a smaller variety (maximum 30cm height and 75cm spread – 12in x 30in), which has creamy-white flowers; Goldmine, aka Mine d'Or, with golden blooms; Snow White; Tangerine; and Spreading Sunset, with orange flowers developing red tints as they age.
