FLOWER OF THE WEEK: KAFFIR LILY.

162nd in a series.

It is difficult to decide where to begin with this lovely autumn-flowering member of the iris family. From 1864 its botanical name was *Schizostylis cocchinea* and it was regarded as a single species. That was until 2018 when the plant was reclassified as *Hesperantha cocchinea* and, since my knowledge of the other 50-60 species of hesperantha is limited, let us focus on Kaffir Lily for the purposes of this brief profile.

The home of Kaffir lilies is southern Africa where their rhizomes flourish in damp situations and their long, sword-like leaves remain green for much of the year. Spikes of several cup-shaped flowers, usually with pointed petals, open in late summer, autumn and winter. Plants grow 60cm (2ft) tall and form a clump 30cm (12in) across.

The *cocchinea* species bears scarlet blooms but varieties of other colours have been bred or selected. Sunrise and Mrs Hegarty (pictured) are salmon-pink; Major (aka Grandiflora) is rich orange-red; Viscountess Byng is very pale pink; and the form *alba* is white.

The name *Schizostylis coccinea* was given by William Backhouse and William Harvey in 1864. *Schizo* from the Greek to split or divide and *stylis* meaning columns, referring to the styles in the plant's female flowers, which have three prominent styles. *Cocchinea* means scarlet or carmine – as in cochineal, which comes from a scale insect and was once widely used for colouring in cake icing and other cookery purposes. Coincidentally, like schizostylis, the name cochineal is banned, at least from food labelling in the UK, presumably in favour synthetic dyes.

Some 30 years before schizostylis was named, William Harvey, an Irish Quaker and passionate plantsman, had become the British government's treasurer-general in South Africa. Having taken up residence, he would rise before dawn every day, collecting plant specimens in the mountains or on the seashore. In March 1837 he wrote: "I have taken so many excursions lately that I almost fear I shall earn the sobriquet of Her Majesty's pleasurergeneral."

For the record, the name *Hesperantha* is derived from the Greek *hesperos* meaning evening and *anthos* for flower.
