FLOWER OF THE WEEK: ASTILBE. 152nd in a series.

THE feathery flowers of astilbes, grouped in a lightly shaded border, create an unusual and striking display in midsummer with elegant spires bearing thousands of tiny long-lasting blooms in shades of red, pink, purple or white. The fern-like leaves are attractive, too, though some are quite dull, which is thought to give rise to the plant's name – astilbe comes from the Greek *astilbos*, meaning "without brightness." There are several species which come from moist situations on riversides, in woodland and in mountain clefts in North America and south-east Asia. Their height varies from a few inches to a metre.

The best tall kinds include *Astilbe* Amethyst, flowering in early summer, on plumes a metre tall; *Astilbe chinensis* and the many hybrids bred from this species, most reaching about 60cm (2ft), one of which is pictured; *Astilbe* Fanal (pictured), with long-lasting crimson blooms; *Astilbe* Venus, taller with bright pink flowers; with and several German-bred varieties of medium height, around 45cm (18in) such as Federsee (deep pink), Irrlicht (white with dark, purplish-green foliage), Koblenz (salmon-pink), and Purpurlanze (Purple Lance), much taller at 1.2m (4ft), vigorous and tolerant of drier conditions than most with rich purple-red blooms. *Astilbe* Sprite is tall with pale-pink flowers on delicate, weeping stems.

There are also several forms only a few inches tall suitable for waterside positions, among them Bronze Elegance, pinkish-red; Gnome, pink with reddish-green foliage; and Perkeo, deep pink.

Holehird Garden, near Windermere, which holds a National Collection of Astilbes (pictured) and of Hydrangeas, as well as many other fine flower displays, is well worth visiting.
