FLOWER OF THE WEEK: EREMURUS

145th in a series.

EREMURUS are clump-forming perennials which grow naturally in a wide area of Asia, from Ukraine to the Himalayas in dry, sparse grassland or semi-desert, giving rise to one of their common names, desert candle. Their botanical name comes from the Greek *eremia* (desert) and *pura* (tall). They are fully hardy and have transferred equably to British gardens, preferring welldrained, sandy soil and shelter from wind although they need a cold snap in winter to encourage flowering. Here they are nicknamed foxtail lilies.

The plants spread, producing a number of crowns, from each of which emerges a tall "bottle-brush" spike – up to 2m (6ft) in some species – packed with numerous small flowers which are generally white, pink or yellow, in late spring and early summer.

Eremurus himalaicus (pictured) has white flowers, *Eremurus spectabilis* is yellow and *Eremurus robustus* pink. A series of hybrids, *Eremurus x isabellinus,* includes varieties with blooms in shades of orange, red, deeper pink and even green tinges.

One of the most unlikely plant breeders was Sir Frederick Claude Stern, a retired Army colonel and big game hunter in the early 1900s, who bought a house, Highdown, on the Sussex downs and laid a tennis court among ramshackle pig-sties and chicken houses in the base of a disused chalk quarry. To tried to smarten the place for tennis parties he cleared the debris and planned to plant shrubs. Friends said he would never grow anything on virgin chalk but he prepared the ground with chicken manure and leafmould, then bought a job lot of plants collected from China, many of which flourished. Stern was hooked. He subscribed to plant-collecting expeditions, extended his knowledge and contacts, made scientific studies and starting hybridising plants, magnolias, roses, clematis – and eremurus. He is remembered in numerous plant names, among them the eremurus varieties Highdown Flair and Highdown Dwarf.
