FLOWER OF THE WEEK: A NECKLACE, A ZEBRA AND A SHRIMP.

137th in a series.

Three curious houseplants this week...

TRAILING BEAD PLANT, *Senecio rowleyanus* (pictured), from south-west Africa, is an unusual hanging plant, hard to find in garden centres but very easy to propagate. It grows quickly, producing long stems covered with succulent globular leaves, like a necklace of green pearls. These will dangle 90cm (3ft) or more but can be pruned back. In ideal conditions the plant will produce curious flowers in winter or spring, little white "shaving brushes" with chocolate tips to the "bristles" on slender, upturned stems. It likes a gritty compost, not too rich, with bright light and a steady temperature all year and a minimum 10C (50F) in winter. For best results, the compost should almost dry out before watering in winter. In spring and summer plants should be fed fortnightly with a half-strength liquid general fertiliser.

ZEBRA PLANT *Aphelandra squarrosa* (pictured) is known as the zebra plant because of the bold ivory-white veins on deep green leaves. It comes from Brazil, grows 30cm (1ft) tall in a pot and produces prominent spikes of yellow bracts in summer. It flourishes in bright light at room temperature but needs a few weeks in a cooler place (13C – 55F) after flowering. It is essential to keep the compost wet and give a liquid fertiliser weekly during spring and summer and also important to maintain humidity by misting and keeping the plant on a tray of moist gravel. Zebra plants need very little water in winter. Every spring it should be pruned severely, leaving only a few leaves, then repotted in a rich, gritty compost.

SHRIMP PLANT, *Justicia brandegeeana* (formerly *Beloperone guttata*), is a small, evergreen shrub from Mexico. Its nickname comes from the pretty but odd-looking bracts, russet and greenish-yellow, borne from March to December. *Justicia* was named after James Justice, an 18th-century Scottish horticulturalist, while *brandegeeana* comes from Townsend Brandegee, an American botanist. The plant will grow to 90cm (3ft) tall if transplanted into progressively larger pots but can be kept around 30cm (1ft) by pinching out the growing tips regularly. It is best kept at around 18C (64F) with a winter minimum of 8C (45F), watered copiously from March to November but little in winter, fed from May to September and potted on when necessary into a soil-based compost.
