# **COVID Safety**

As the days grow longer and the weather gets warmer, it's natural that we should want to get out and about and start to do more, especially this year when so many of us have been cut off from friends and family for so long.

But we have to remember that we are still in the midst of a global pandemic which is killing people every day; even though many of us have now been vaccinated that doesn't make us immune to COVID and never will.

We can all still contract this terrible virus; we may not suffer as badly, we may not even know that we've picked it up because we don't show any symptoms but that means we can unknowingly pass it on to others, putting them at even greater risk if they haven't yet been vaccinated.

For the sake of everyone's safety we have to make sure we are aware of and follow the latest Government guidelines.

If you have to share a car with anybody who is outside your 'bubble' there are 10 simple steps you should take to help keep yourself and other passengers safe.

# **Car-Sharing Guidelines:**

- 1. Sanitise your hands when you get into and out of the car and touch as few surfaces as possible
- 2. Avoid physical contact with other passengers
- 3. Share with the same people every time
- 4. Keep journey times as short as possible
- 5. Plan seating to ensure as much distance as possible between individuals
- 6. Wear a face mask while travelling, making sure it is correctly fitted (i.e fully covering both the mouth and nose)
- 7. If you are medically exempt from wearing a mask and have to share a car, face away from other passengers
- 8. Ensure good ventilation by keeping windows open
- Do not use air conditioning as this circulates air and therefore moisture droplets, putting everyone at greater risk
- 10. If you are the driver, keep hand sanitiser and cleaning product in the car; be particularly aware of surfaces you and other passengers may touch (steering wheel, door handles and seats) and clean after each journey. Then wash your hands using soap and water.

Please don't be embarrassed about asking passengers to sanitise their hands and making them aware of the guidelines – it could literally save a life.

# FLOWER OF THE WEEK: LILY OF THE VALLERY 51st in a series

LILY of the valley tends to be planted as an afterthought, perhaps because it is small and has unspectacular flowers. But what the blooms lack in size, they make up for in exquisite shape and scent, extreme hardiness, toleration of shader and the ability, in suitable situations, to cover the ground and choke out weeds. These diminutive herbaceous perennials are native to northern temperate regions which is why they are at home in the UK, though their natural habitat is more mountainous than most British gardens. The plant's common name is highly appropriate. Botanically it is *Convallaria*, from the Latin *convallis*, a valley, referring to one of its natural habitats, and it is a member of the lily family.

There is only one species, Convallaria majalis – majalis means May-flowering. The plants push up bright green, broad pointed leaves in pairs, reaching around 15cm (6in) in height, in mid-spring. Then, by May, a stem emerges from each pair of leaves bearing 10-15 nodding bell-flowers in pure white. After flowering, lily of the valley often produces red berries. Beware – these berries are poisonous. The leaves fade to yellow before disappearing in autumn and fresh foliage reemerges in mid-spring.

For different forms look for Variegata, with gold-striped foliage, or Albostriata with creamy-white stripes; Rosea, a form with pretty pink bells; Prolificans, with tiny clusters of flowers that some fanciers describe as double and others as malformed; Flore Pleno for truly double flowers; and Fontin's Giant, which flowers later, producing larger blooms than the others. All are eminently suitable for wild-effect gardens, for growing under trees and as ground-cover in shrub and mixed borders. They prefer shade for part of the day and fairly fertile soil which is moist but not waterlogged. Plant a clump of the thin rhizomes in autumn and they will spread over the following years. In ideal conditions they might spread too far but they are easily checked by digging up roots from the edges of the clump in autumn.

The flowers' fragrance is superb but far out of range of most people's noses. That's why they are sometimes grown in pots (they prefer clay pots to plastic) or cut for display in small vases in the house where the scent can fill a room. The flowers last best in water if they are gathered not by cutting but by pulling – taking a stem between forefinger and thumb then giving a short, sharp jerk.
