FLOWER OF THE WEEK: FREESIA



Freesias are among the most appealing indoor flowers in winter, with their delightfully scented tubular flowers on 30cm-45cm (12in-18in) stems and dazzling colours. Freesias are named after a German physicist, Friedrich Freese, and originate from South Africa, a clear indication of the climate they like. From the six wild species more than 300 varieties have been bred. Some are bicoloured, such as Oberon, rich red with a yellow throat; Blue Heaven, pale mauve with white streaks and a yellow throat; and Elan, lilac with a white throat. Others are of single colours, including Rijnveld's Yellow; Golden Melody; double mauve Romany; White Swan; and deep rose-pink Everett.

Freesias can be bought as corms or as cut flowers but can be fairly easily grown from seed for display in pots or the garden. Sow seeds under glass with heat in the next few weeks. They should flower this year but will in any case produce corms. Whether or not they flower, the corms should be lifted and dried when the leaves start to wilt and stored in a dry, cool but frost-free place. They can be planted in pots in autumn for late winter flowering indoors or in April in the garden for a summer display.

In the garden, give them any reasonable soil as long as it is well-drained, and a sheltered position in sun or partial shade. Water well in dry weather. Indoors or out, they should not be exposed to temperatures under 7C (45F) when in growth.

As long as the seedlings are transplanted into a rich compost, they need little or no feeding. If planting corms outdoors in April, place them 5cm (2in) deep and a little farther apart.
