FLOWER OF THE WEEK: CAMASSIA

138th in a series.

Camassias are a star of the garden show in late spring – literally. Their bulbs produce tall spikes that explode with brilliant blue, starshaped flowers from the base upwards. The blooms do not last long but there are few displays as dazzling.

They originate from western North America where the Chinook tribe of Native Americans, who used to eat the bulbs, named them *kamas* or *quamash*. As their native habitat suggests, they are not totally hardy in Britain though the bulbs will cope with temperatures down to minus 5C (23F) or lower when heavily mulched through winter.

Camassias dislike disturbance so are best left to naturalise. Since they like moist or even heavy ground, they are often grown in moist grassland. The problem is that wet ground exacerbates winter's cold so, unless they can be offered a sunny, sheltered situation, the bulbs can rot. They are more likely to survive in soil that drains readily, though they will not spread as rapidly, and can also be grown in large, deep pots.

The most popular kinds include *Camassia leichtlinii*, one of the most striking kinds with creamy white flowers on stems up to 1.3m (4ft 4in) tall, though the *Caerulea* subspecies (pictured) has midblue to violet blooms; *Camassia esculenta*, also tautologously known as *Camassia quamash*, which grows flower spikes to 80cm (32in) tall with blooms opening along the top 30cm (12in). Other species include: *Camassia cusickii*, the earliest to flower, giving a wonderful impression of lightness with spikes smothered in pale blue flowers with lemon-yellow anthers; *Camassia scilloides*, from the central and eastern US, which is smaller, reaching only 60cm (24in) but daintier, with flowers of blue, violet or white.

Camassias are normally bought as bulbs and propagated by splitting large clumps in autumn and transplanting immediately. They are normally untroubled by pets or diseases but have one drawback – the long, pointed leaves, so elegant in spring, become scruffy when dying. In grass, that does not much matter but, when planted in a border, they are best sited behind plants that will grow up later to hide the unsightly foliage.
